2. perform one or more new dances satisfactorily.

3. describe how posture relates to dance (or, for more experienced dancers, maintain or improve mobility, posture and/or co-ordination through dance).

4. discuss something new that has been learned of the background of a dance, or of other cultures through their music and dance.

### **What teaching methods will be used and will there be work outside of the class?**

- The WEA tutor will use a range of different teaching and learning methods and encourage you and the group to be actively involved in your learning

### **What kind of feedback can I expect from the tutor?**

- There is no formal assessment (i.e. no exams). Informal assessment will be via the tutor's observation of dancers, discussion, and self-assessment on the WEA learning record forms.

### **What else do I need to know? Is there anything I need to bring?**

- No special dance shoes are needed, but please wear comfortable footwear with soles that will neither slip nor grip too tightly on a wooden floor.
