Course Aim

To develop ICT skills for the purpose of learning and taking Driving theory test and hazard perception test as part of the DVSA driving test examination in UK

Course Description

This is a course for anyone wishing to prepare for the DVSA theory test element including the hazard perception part of the examination.

Do I need any particular skills or experience?

What will I achieve?

By the end of the course I will be able to:

1. Distinguish the main colours and symbols used in road signs (Highway code)
2. Evaluate what is hazard awareness and successfully identify a developing hazard
3. Able to recognise types of vulnerable road users
4. Types of road crossing and meanings
5. Driving theory mock tests

What teaching methods will be used and will there be work outside of the class?

- The WEA tutor will use a range of different teaching and learning methods and encourage you and the group to be actively involved in your learning
- You may be asked to undertake additional work in your own time to support your learning
- You will be expected to carry out a range of activities in your own time

What kind of feedback can I expect from the tutor?

- A range of informal activities will be used by the tutor to see what you are learning which may include quizzes, question and answer, small projects and discussion
- You will have opportunities to discuss your progress with your tutor
- You will be encouraged to share your work with the group and discuss your learning
- You will be encouraged to consider other students work and give your opinions and suggestions

- All materials will be provided
- A selection of materials and basic equipment will be provided but you are welcome to bring additional materials with you
- It would be helpful if you had access to the internet (Mobile phone, tablet or computer at home or through a library etc.)
