Course Aim

Course Description

The course is about the understanding and manipulation of materials, media, processes and techniques to produce a variety of Christmas Crafts. We will be exploring a variety of techniques such as collage, weaving, decoupage and printing processes such as stamping and block. We will be exploring the many different shapes and patterns that we associate with Christmas such as the tree, snowflake and star.

What will I achieve?

By the end of the course I will be able to:

- 1. Understand and analyse the use of certain media, materials, processes and techniques
- 2. Manipulate and explore the use of certain media, materials, processes and techniques
- 3. To refine and produce their own work using the use of certain media, materials, processes and techniques
- 4. To be able to review and evaluate your own work

5. Review and evaluate the work of others (their peers and other artists, designers, crafters) to inspire improvement in your own work

What teaching methods will be used and will there be work outside of the class?

- The WEA tutor will use a range of different teaching and learning methods and encourage you and the group to be actively involved in your learning
- You may be asked to undertake additional work in your own time to support your learning
- You will be expected to carry out a range of activities in your own time

What kind of feedback can I expect from the tutor?

- A range of informal activities will be used by the tutor to see what you are learning which may include quizzes, question and answer, small projects and discussion
- You will have opportunities to discuss your progress with your tutor
- You will be encouraged to share your work with the group and discuss your learning
- You will be encouraged to consider other students work and give your opinions and suggestions
- A file of work will be kept which will help to record your progress
- There will be a number of tasks appropriate to your course such as written work, creating art or craft, video, photography or small projects. Some of these may be marked to help you progress

- A selection of materials and basic equipment will be provided but you are welcome to bring additional materials with you
- It would be helpful if you had access to the internet (Mobile phone, tablet or computer at home or through a library etc.)
