Course Aim

An introduction to the process of protest and reform between 1830 - 1900, using contemporary sources to illustrate and discuss its origins and its continuing relevance today.

Course Description

The course will use a range of material including contemporary sources to examine a number of key protests and reforms between 1830 and 1900, with a view to examining their causes and impact and the continuing significance of some incidents to this day.

What will I achieve?

By the end of the course I will be able to:

1. Have an initial understanding of protest movements and events in the period prior to 1832
2. Review the events leading up to the Great Reform Act of 1832
3. Describe the aims and actions of the Chartists in the 1830s and 1840s

What teaching methods will be used and will there be work outside of the class?

- The WEA tutor will use a range of different teaching and learning methods and encourage you and the group to be actively involved in your learning

What kind of feedback can I expect from the tutor?

- A range of informal activities will be used by the tutor to see what you are learning which may include quizzes, question and answer, small projects and discussion
