#### Course Aim

Using simple folk tunes students will have the opportunity to explore and develop their musical skills through online ensemble playing and practice.

#### **Course Description**

This course is aimed at beginners with a basic understanding of their instruments. It offers the opportunity to become more confident with your chosen instrument by learning and playing a range of popular traditional folk tunes both individually and as a part of an online ensemble. You will gain more understanding of basic musical language, performance skills and how to learn and practice tunes.

When playing online all students will be muted but you will hear the tutor playing live and be able to play along.

Students will need to supply their own instrument with the focus on guitar, violin, ukulele and melodeon. Other instrument players welcome also.

Do I need any particular skills or experience?

What will I achieve?

By the end of the course I will be able to:

1. Play simple folk tunes

- 2. Demonstrate a regular practice routine through completion of an online practice diary
- 3. Develop more confidence with chosen instrument demonstrated through reflective writing in online practice diary
- 4. Play as part of online ensemble
- 5. Know some basic musical terms and concepts

## What teaching methods will be used and will there be work outside of the class?

- The WEA's digital learning platform, Canvas will be used to provide resources or to support lessons, enable assessment, provide learner feedback and for other activities for individuals away from the course. - The WEA tutor will use a range of different teaching and learning methods and encourage you and the group to be actively involved in your learning
- You may be asked to undertake additional work in your own time to support your learning
- You will be expected to carry out a range of activities in your own time

#### What kind of feedback can I expect from the tutor?

- You will be able to keep a record of your progress and achievement using photos, audio, text or documents uploaded into the WEA's digital learning platform, WEA Canvas.
- Your tutor will provide written, text and audio feedback recorded in WEA Canvas, WEA's digital learning platform.
- You will be able to keep a digital portfolio of your work on WEA's digital learning platform, Canvas.
- A range of informal activities will be used by the tutor to see what you are learning which may include quizzes, question and answer, small projects and discussion
- You will have opportunities to discuss your progress with your tutor
- You will be encouraged to share your work with the group and discuss your learning
- You will be encouraged to consider other students work and give your opinions and suggestions
- There will be a number of tasks appropriate to your course such as written work, creating art or craft, video, photography or small projects. Some of these may be marked to help you progress
