You can enjoy learning new skills while creating beautiful items of Jewellery for yourself, as presents or to sell.

Do I need any particular skills or experience?

What will I achieve?

By the end of the course I will be able to:

1. Create a pendant or earrings incorporating decorative tube and wire rivets

- 2. Produce a section of chain using links that are joined with rivets
- 3. Construct a ring that is joined with functional/decorative rivets
- 4. Use rivets to attach an overlay of sheet metal onto another piece of sheet metal
- 5. Design Jewellery using a variety of riveting techniques

What teaching methods will be used and will there be work outside of the class?

- The WEA's digital learning platform, Canvas will be used to provide resources or to support lessons, enable assessment, provide learner feedback and for other activities for individuals away from the course. - You will be encouraged to consider other students work and give your opinions and suggestions
