Course Aim

to provide an introduction into the art of cake decorating, which will enable you to create a range of different celebration cakes, for friends and family.

Course Description

During this 3 week short Introduction course, you will get an insight into the art of cake decorating, which will enable to follow on into the Level 1 Creative crafts in Cake Decorating.

This course is ideal for beginner as we will cover the very basics of cake decorating, using sugarcraft tools, and you will complete at least one fully decorated cake.

What will I achieve?

By the end of the course I will be able to:

- 1. Learn how to use correctly sugarcraft tools of the trade and what they are used for.
- 2. understand the basics of food hygiene for the use within cake decorating industry
- 3. Learn how to cover a cake with fondant sugar icing.
- 4. crumb coat a cake and the reasons for doing this.
- 5. make simple decorations from sugar modelling paste, which will be used for decorating a

fondant iced cake.

What teaching methods will be used and will there be work outside of the class?

- The WEA's digital learning platform, Canvas will be used to provide resources or to support lessons, enable assessment, provide learner feedback and for other activities for individuals away from the course. - A range of informal activities will be used by the tutor to see what you are learning which may include quizzes, question and answer, small projects and discussion
- You will have opportunities to discuss your progress with your tutor
- You will be encouraged to share your work with the group and discuss your learning
- You will be encouraged to consider other students work and give your opinions and suggestions
- A file of work will be kept which will help to record your progress
- There will be a number of tasks appropriate to your course such as written work, creating art or craft, video, photography or small projects. Some of these may be marked to help you progress
- the tutor will also give information as to where is the best places to buy any resources that may be needed
