Course Description Find out more about the long history of Fulwood near Sheffield. Using photographs, maps and documents this six week evening course will cover farming, transport, pubs, sports and leisure, moors, parks and woodland, suburban growth and shops. To complement this term's taught sessions we are hoping to be able to do some exploratory walks in and around Fulwood in the summer. Monday evenings 7-9pm online for 6 weeks from 4 January 2021.

What will I achieve? By the end of the course I will be able to: 1. Understand the growth and development of the Sheffield suburb of Fulwood 2. Know more about the people important to the historical development of Fulwood

3. Know more about the places important to the historical development of Fulwood
