Course Aim

to introduce students to influential philosophical theories of language and to give them the opportunity to reflect on their own understanding of language

Course Description

Does language represent the world, or is it the other way round - that we can only live in a world our words allow us to see? Do words have a fixed meaning, or is Humpty Dumpty right - that words mean 'just what we want them to mean'? This course explores questions like these with the help of philosophers including Wittgenstein. Previous knowledge of philosophy is not expected. Course content: How do we know the meaning of words? relativist views of language and Humpty Dumpty; Does silence have a meaning? Can language represent the world? 'item-centred' views and the 'picture theory' of language; sense and reference. Structuralism or Do we speak the language or does the language speak us? Wittgenstein: "The meaning of a word is its use."; family resemblances; the limits of language. Speech act theory or "How to do things with words". Can language be a window to metaphysical realities (for example according to Heidegger).

Do I need any particular skills or experience?

What will I achieve?

By the end of the course I will be able to:

1. give a clear account of your own understanding of how we know the meaning of words

- 2. show how features in the approaches covered relate to your own experience and use of language
- 3.

explain what is distinctive about at least two approaches to language covered on the course

- 4. provide a more detailed account of language, meaning and communication according to at least own of the approaches covered
- 5. explain to what extent your own understanding of language, meaning and communication has changed as a result of the course

What teaching methods will be used and will there be work outside of the class?
