## Course Aim

To gain an insight into the wealth of the Low Countries in the Middle Ages, the division of the Low Countries, the impact of the growth of major European states upon the area, and the Battlefield of Europe.

## Course Description

For nearly two thousand years the lands at the mouth of the River Rhine have been a centre of trade and industry and at the same time been the target of major political rivalries. The Middle Ages saw the Low Countries as probably the richest area of Europe. But with the consolidation of political structures in France and Germany, and the split within the Low Countries between the South and the United Provinces of the Netherlands, the South became over the past five hundred years the scene of a series of major European Wars and battles.
