Course Aim
This course studies the Channel Coastlands, the physical cliffs and beaches, but also the human component of ports, resorts and 'sleepy hollows'. From Kent to Hampshire via Sussex and the Isle of Wight we study these varied components of the landscape

Course Description
This course studies the many facets of the Channel Coastlands, both the physical, the cliffs and beaches, but also the human component of ports, resorts and 'sleepy hollows'. From Kent to Hampshire via Sussex and the Isle of Wight we look at these varied components. The geological coast is one of high chalk cliffs with sheer drops, tumbling sandstones and slumping low clays. These face onto beaches of hard flint shingle, coarse and rounded; sandy shorelines of flat, hard tidal zones and windblown dunes; chalk platforms of rockpools, and mudflats of eel grass and glasswort. Amongst this physical landscape is one we have created of ancient settlements, ports, defences and fishing communities, but we also have the coast as a leisure and domestic area, of fashionable resorts, retirement areas and a variety of suburbs. We look at a range of these aspects using illustrated lectures and directed reading tied to student requirements... and tutors knowledge!

What will I achieve?

By the end of the course I will be able to:

1. Identify the main physical features of the coast
2. Identify the varied geology of the coast and how that affects the appearance
3. Be aware of the variety of human landscapes along the coast
4. Be aware of the social landscape that influences the human landscape
5. Be aware of the changes that have occurred in both the physical and social landscape of the coast

What teaching methods will be used and will there be work outside of the class?

- A range of informal activities will be used by the tutor to see what you are learning which may include quizzes, question and answer, small projects and discussion
- You will have opportunities to discuss your progress with your tutor
- You will be encouraged to share your work with the group and discuss your learning
- You will be encouraged to consider other students work and give your opinions and suggestions
- A file of work will be kept which will help to record your progress
- There will be a number of tasks appropriate to your course such as written work, creating art or craft,

video, photography or small projects. Some of these may be marked to help you progress
