Course Aim

To introduce the core skills in basic sewing techniques and pattern reading which will help students to work through and complete a project of their own choice

Course Description

This course will provide students with the skills to read and understand pattern data and use the information to complete a project. Students will chose their own project with support from tutor if required. Both sewing machines and overlockers can be used on this course and students new to sewing can learn how to sew on a sewing machine and make a project of their own choice.

Do I need any particular skills or experience?

What will I achieve?

By the end of the course I will be able to:

- 1. Sort and select information from a pattern for my own personal use
- 2. choose the appropriate core skills and techniques required to make a project
- 3. plan and record the progress of a project
- 4. set up and use a sewing machine or overlocker without any help
- 5. organize and make samples of necessary techniques to complete a project

What teaching methods will be used and will there be work outside of the class?

- The WEA tutor will use a range of different teaching and learning methods and encourage you and the group to be actively involved in your learning
- You will be expected to carry out a range of activities in your own time

What kind of feedback can I expect from the tutor?

- A range of informal activities will be used by the tutor to see what you are learning which may include quizzes, question and answer, small projects and discussion
- You will have opportunities to discuss your progress with your tutor
- You will be encouraged to share your work with the group and discuss your learning
- You will be encouraged to consider other students work and give your opinions and suggestions
- A file of work will be kept which will help to record your progress
- There will be a number of tasks appropriate to your course such as written work, creating art or craft, video, photography or small projects. Some of these may be marked to help you progress

What else do I need to know? Is there anything I need to bring?

- A selection of materials and basic equipment will be provided but you are welcome to bring additional materials with you
- It would be helpful if you had access to the internet (Mobile phone, tablet or computer at home or through a library etc.)
